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
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




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TERRY DONAHUE

Emotion at the tips of his fingers

TERRY DONAHUE DEMONSTRATES HIS PROFOUND RESPECT FOR WILDLIFE IN HIS HIGHLY EXPRESSIVE PAINTINGS. HIS DYNAMIC COMPOSITIONS MAINTAIN THEIR DISTANCE FROM A MORE TYPICAL HYPERREALIST APPROACH AND CLEARLY DISPLAY HIS LOVE FOR HIS SUBJECTS.



Terry Donahue was born in 1956 in Duluth, Minnesota. At a very early age he became profoundly aware of the emotions that nature could inspire in him and still remembers the bears and moose that visited the garden of his youth. Today, the deep respect and fascination for wild animals that those experiences brought him is still intact. His first and greatest influence was his brother - also an artist - who quickly recognised the talent of his precocious younger sibling. Terry Donahue began to paint with oils on canvas and went on to study fine arts at the University of Nebraska in Omaha. After a successful career as an illustrator, he decided to return to his first love: painting. It was in pastels that he discovered the ideal medium for conveying his emotions.

From realism to expressionism

His complete mastery of the medium allows him to reproduce realistic textures and a dynamic feel for movement and space. He uses strong tones that often contrast powerfully with the white of the canvas or the abstract background. As the artist himself says: *"I chose to work in pastels thirteen years ago as a way to get away from my hyperrealist style. At the time I was painting portraits in oils. Like many other artists, I wanted to see just how much realism and detail I could get into my paintings and drawings. When I finally achieved my objective, I realised that I needed to be a lot more expressive, more of a "painter", or to put it another way, I needed to work on my artistic identity. I needed to change and to set myself a challenge; pastel turned out to be the technique I was looking for. It is perfectly suited to a looser style and it lets me add life and movement to the image".*




